### Research Resources and Questions Causes of Conflict Classroom Based Assessment

- 2. Analyze why at least two of the following are factors of the causes of the conflict: Political, Economic, Geographic, Social.
- 3. What kind of destruction or change occurred because of the conflict?
- 4. Based on the first three sources provided to you, what gaps are there in your understanding of the conflict/causes of this conflict? What information do you need to find to make your understanding complete?
- 5. Find a 4<sup>th</sup> source and list it here. Based on the source's information, what new information can you add to your essay/presentation?
- 6. Is your understanding of the causes of the conflict complete?
- As you finish research, submit research findings to me (your 4th source's citation only) with a 150-200 word summary of how it helps your understanding of the causes of the conflict
